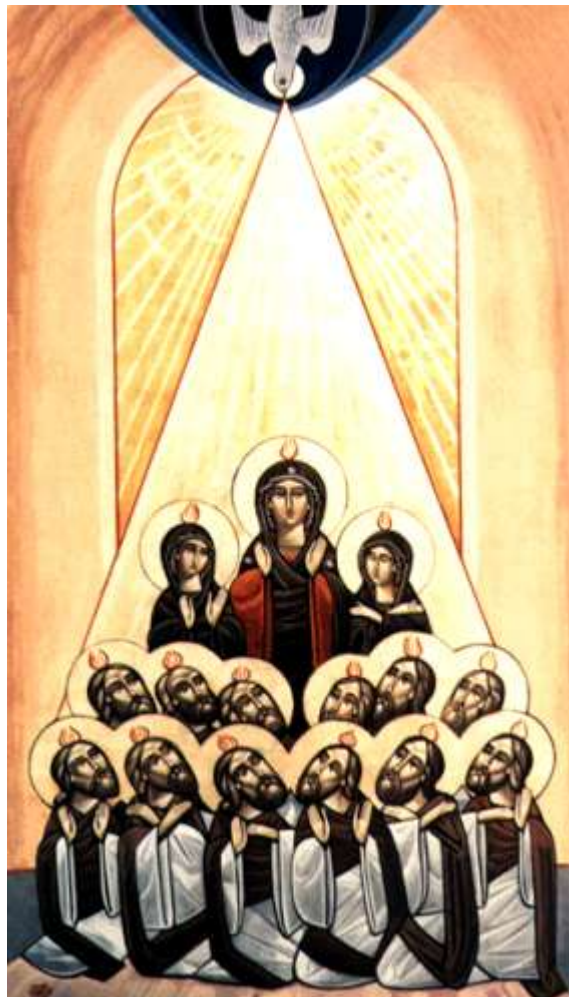

The First Reading

Acts 2:1-11

Lector A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs-- in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power."

Send them forth in the power of that Spirit to perform the service you set before them; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen.*

For Confirmation

May the Holy Spirit, who has begun a good work in you, direct and uphold you in the service of Christ and his kingdom. *Amen.*

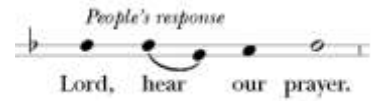

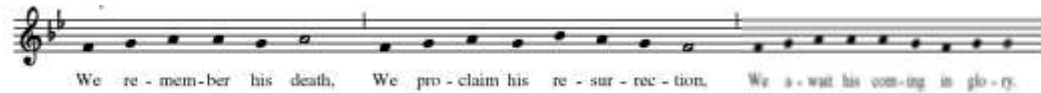
We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

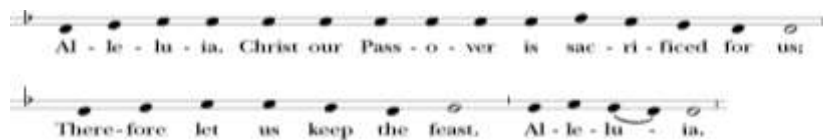

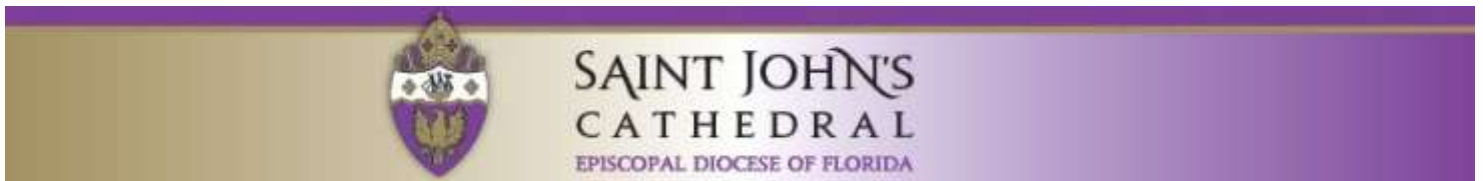

New Leadership Councils for the Cathedral

The Vestry has been working diligently to develop a long-term plan based on feedback from the recent Mutual Ministry Review, which indicated the need for strategic planning as well as increased Vestry engagement.

Our desire is to create a planning and implementation process that would

- build upon past planning studies and surveys,
- encourage lay leadership,
- provide structure for shared decisions and
- engage our Cathedral community in multiple ways of serving God.

Dean Kate asked us to ensure that the foundation for this work was based on scripture. We have selected two scriptures to direct our work.

- One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, “Which commandment is the first of all?” Jesus answered, “The first is, ‘Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength’. The second is this, ‘You shall love your neighbor as yourself.’ There is no other commandment greater than these.” Mark 12:28-31
- “Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.” Matthew 28:19-20

At the Vestry Retreat held on May 8 & 9, we made significant progress in developing this plan.

New Leadership Councils for the Cathedral (cont.)

First, we agreed that our approach must follow the Book of Common Prayer, which defines the mission of the Church. We have adopted this as the St. John's Cathedral mission.

The mission of St. John's Cathedral is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ. We pursue our mission as we pray and worship, proclaim the Gospel, and promote justice, peace and love.

Second, we agreed to use the concept of a Master Plan, which is a framework with an associated process. The framework identified six major Focus Areas for the Cathedral. We will develop and implement our Master Plan by creating and maintaining Leadership Councils for each of the Focus Areas, with participation by Vestry members, clergy, staff and parishioners. Membership, beyond the assigned Vestry, clergy and staff is flexible, but with a commitment to provide a forum for interested parishioners. We envision a Master Plan that is enduring, dynamic, interconnected and participatory.

Over the next month, Vestry members will begin organizing the Leadership Councils. All who are interested in assisting should contact one or both of the Vestry members for each Focus Area. In addition, the Vestry members will be reaching out to our current ministries and committees to ensure that all are placed within an appropriate Focus Area.

The next step for each Focus Area will be planning, which will include selecting guiding scriptures, setting a vision for where we wish to be, stating clearly where we are, and setting goals, action items and milestones to be achieved.

By Rally Day, we will publish our initial draft of the above. Rally Day will be an opportunity for you as members of the congregation to commit to the Leadership Councils that interest you and to sign up for specific action items in each Focus Area.

By November, each Leadership Council will present their written plan to the Vestry for approval and publication of our Master Plan before the end of the year. This Master Plan will be a "living document," updated annually and revised as needed.

It is our heartfelt desire that this plan will provide opportunities for significantly increased engagement by our Cathedral membership. This work will be successful to the extent that we come together as a community to use our collective resources to do the work that Christ has empowered us to do.

WHAT IS PENTECOST? Today we celebrate the great event of the Pentecost, the day that the Holy Spirit came down to anoint Jesus' followers. But what is the Holy Spirit?
