Support the Cathedral Arts Project

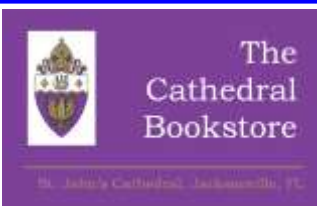

Understanding the real Mary Magdalene

Dear friends,

Last weekend, I traveled to Fayetteville, North Carolina to speak as part of a series offered by the Episcopal Booksellers Association. I had a chance to talk to them about Mary Magdalene and the research that I'm doing on her for the purposes of writing a book. During Lent, I'm teaching a series of classes based on this material at 10 a.m. on Sundays in Taliaferro Hall. If you've missed the first few classes, don't worry, you are still welcome to come!

Some of you have asked me, "Why teach or write about Mary Magdalene?" For years, I've had two icons of Mary Magdalene hanging in my office. She fascinates me as one of the most misunderstood characters in all of Scripture. For centuries, the church viewed her as a prostitute and a wayward woman, but there is no evidence of this in any of the gospels themselves. She gets confused with the woman caught in adultery and the woman who washed Jesus' feet with oil and wiped them with her hair. Even today, books such as *The Da Vinci Code* paint her as a sex symbol who married or at least had sexual relations with Jesus. It is a wonder to me how we have misinterpreted such a central figure in church history. I think that understanding Mary Magdalene and her role in Jesus' life may be a key to unlocking the shame that many women have felt throughout history, and that some still feel even today.

I invite you to join me on Sunday mornings for the next few weeks as we unravel the mystery of this miraculous woman and how she came to worship Jesus as her Lord.
