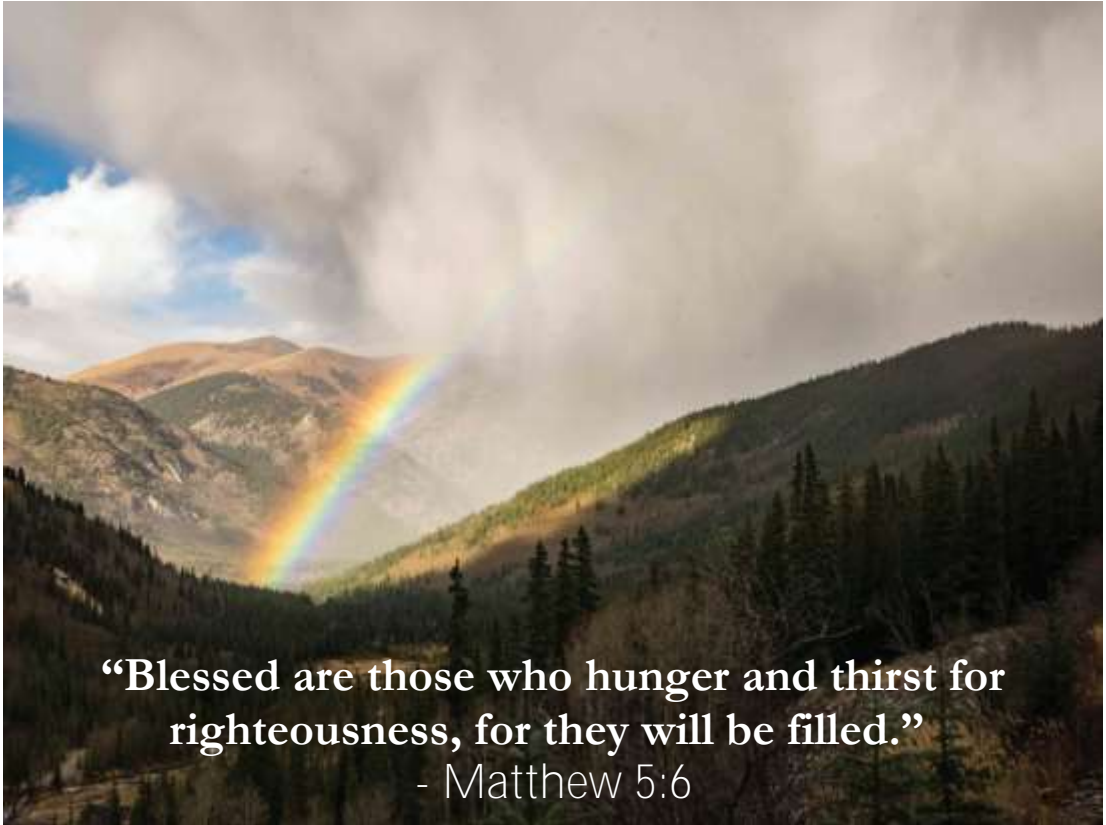

COME TO OUR ANNUAL PARISH MEETING NEXT SUNDAY

Dear Friends,

On Sunday, February 5, we will meet for our Annual Parish Meeting as a congregation. Yes, we only have one parish-wide meeting every year. And this one meeting is *very* important.

What do we do at the Annual Parish Meeting?

- ◆ We meet after the 11 a.m. service for just about one hour.
- ◆ Lunch is served and we eat together.
- ◆ We pray for those in our cathedral community who have died this year.
- ◆ We elect our leadership.
- ◆ We hear about the state of the church.

Some of my fellow deans think that I am crazy for having actual elections at our annual meeting. Many cathedrals just present a slate of nominees chosen by a committee, but I believe in elections. It gives the power back to you, the people of the parish, to elect your leaders. Please remember that *every* person who has been nominated is excellent and I wish we could elect them all. They are faithful people courageous enough to let themselves be presented, and most of them will not be elected.

I will be talking to you about the state of our cathedral and the state of the church in this nation. We are in a time of great transition, greater even than when the printing presses were invented and the Reformation was born. Communication is rapidly altering and churches all over the country are closing or shrinking. We will talk about the health of our beautiful church and how we can ensure its future.

Please do all that you can to be present next Sunday, February 5 for this crucial meeting. May God bless you.

The Lesson

1 Corinthians 1:18-31

Lector

A Reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, “I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.” Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in

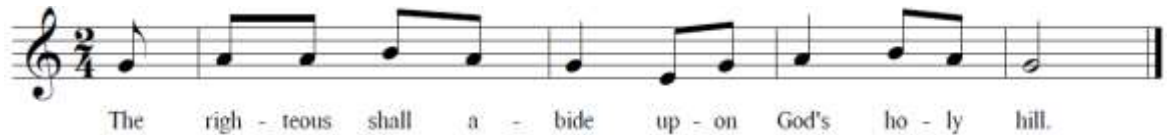
the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God. He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and **righteousness and sanctification and redemption, in order that, as it is written, “Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord.”**

The Celebrant and People say

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayers of the People *All remain standing as able.*

Lector Almighty God, we gather in this house of prayer to give you thanks, to pray for the sick and suffering, and to ask for your light to enter the world. Let us pray together will all our hearts saying, Christ, be our light.

Lector For the world, that all the nations of the earth may come to honor and respect one another. We pray especially for the people of the Middle East and Europe. May we all come to know the peace of God. Let us pray together saying:

People *Christ, be our light.*

Lector For the suffering: the hungry and the sick, the refugee and the prisoner, those who grieve and those who are alone. I invite you to speak aloud the names of those in need.... Let us pray together saying:

People *Christ, be our light.*

Lector For our families, friends, and all those we love, for all those we encounter in our daily life and work, for those estranged from us, for those who hate us, and for those who feel unloved. Let us pray together saying:

People *Christ, be our light.*

Lector For the earth, that we may use its resources wisely, and be thankful for the gift of all creation. Let us pray together saying:

People *Christ, be our light.*

Lector For those who have died, both known and unknown to us. May they receive the joys of **heaven. I invite you to speak aloud the names of those who have died....** Let us pray together saying:

People *Christ, be our light.*

Silence

The Celebrant concludes the prayers.

The Confession of Sin

The People kneel. The Celebrant says

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Celebrant and People

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen.*

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

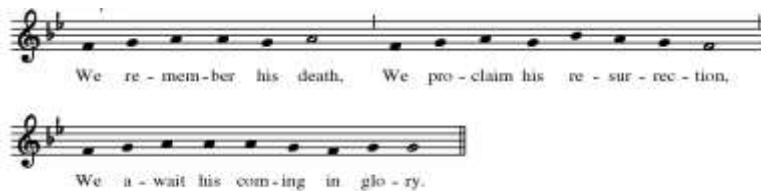

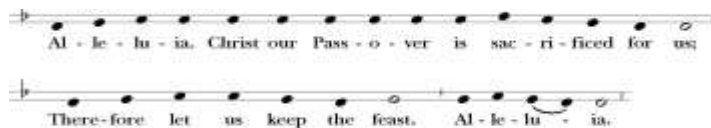
By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN.*

God and Human Conflict: Living Faithfully in a Violent World - Taliaferro Hall

Today's guest speaker is **Dr. Scott Brown**, associate professor of medieval art history at UNF, and his topic will be "Faith and Free Thought in a Violent World."

The story of Jael in the book of Judges is a shocking tale of violence in the Old Testament that raises questions about the relation of faith and violence. During the Reformation, Catholic and Protestant groups used Jael to justify violence and intolerance in the name of faith, but Jael also inspired religious free thinkers during this era, who found inspiration in her for a faith that sought peace and reconciliation. This view of Jael offers an example for our own communities of faith in times of violence and conflict.
