

The Lesson

Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7

Lector A Reading from the Book of Genesis.

The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. And the Lord God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die." Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden?'" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die.'" But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. Holy Spirit, giver of life, come upon us now; may this bread and wine be to us the body and blood of our Savior Jesus Christ.



A recent mission trip to Cuba

At the request of Dean Kate, Christine and I, accompanied by John Burr who chronicled the event, were recently honored to escort a delegation from the Diocese of Houston, including Bishop Andy Doyle and Dean of Christ Church Cathedral Barkley Thompson, to Havana. The purpose of the trip was to introduce the Houston church to the Diocese of Cuba and its Bishop, Rt. Reverend Griselda Delgado, at the Diocesan headquarters at Holy Trinity Cathedral (and do some sightseeing around this exotic island). In recent months travel to Cuba has become easier and less expensive with the introduction of regularly scheduled airline service to Havana and other locations.

During our stay we had many opportunities to meet with Bishop Griselda and her staff and learn about the plans and needs of the Diocese and its 46 congregations and some 10,000 Episcopalians. Cuba is a poor country and the peoples' needs are great. Almost everything is imported, and there is very little hard currency to buy what little is available. In contrast, the people are industrious, well-educated and enthusiastic. (The church ladies are especially ecstatic about gifts of perfumed soap and lipstick. These are rare commodities and unaffordable to most.)

The church reflects these realities. They get by on what they have, but just barely. The lovely cathedral badly needs wood repairs so the stained glass windows don't fall out. The priests' salaries are quite meager, and many have to travel fairly significant distances to service multiple congregations. Our Diocesan Cuba Committee has been most helpful in raising funds to supplement salaries. Fortunately, all Cubans receive free health care and subsistence food, but dealing with the government is bizarre at best.

On the other hand, the church has ambitious plans. The Cathedral just completed an on-site dormitory to house out-of-town visitors who otherwise could not afford Havana hotel prices, which are quite high because of the increasing number of tourists. Bishop Howard contributed funds to purchase a refrigerator for the dorm.

One of the most ambitious projects is the development of Camp Blankenship (named after the last Anglican Bishop of Cuba, who is revered by the people) outside Santa Clara in the southern part of the country. When completed it will resemble Camp Weed. In addition to providing meeting and retreat facilities, through its agricultural projects, it will provide an economic stimulus to the area. Most rural areas are especially poor. Our group visited the site, and everyone was impressed with the site and plans.

John, Christine and I are available to discuss Cuba at any time. If you plan to visit Cuba, we can offer many important insights. Please pray for the church in Cuba.
