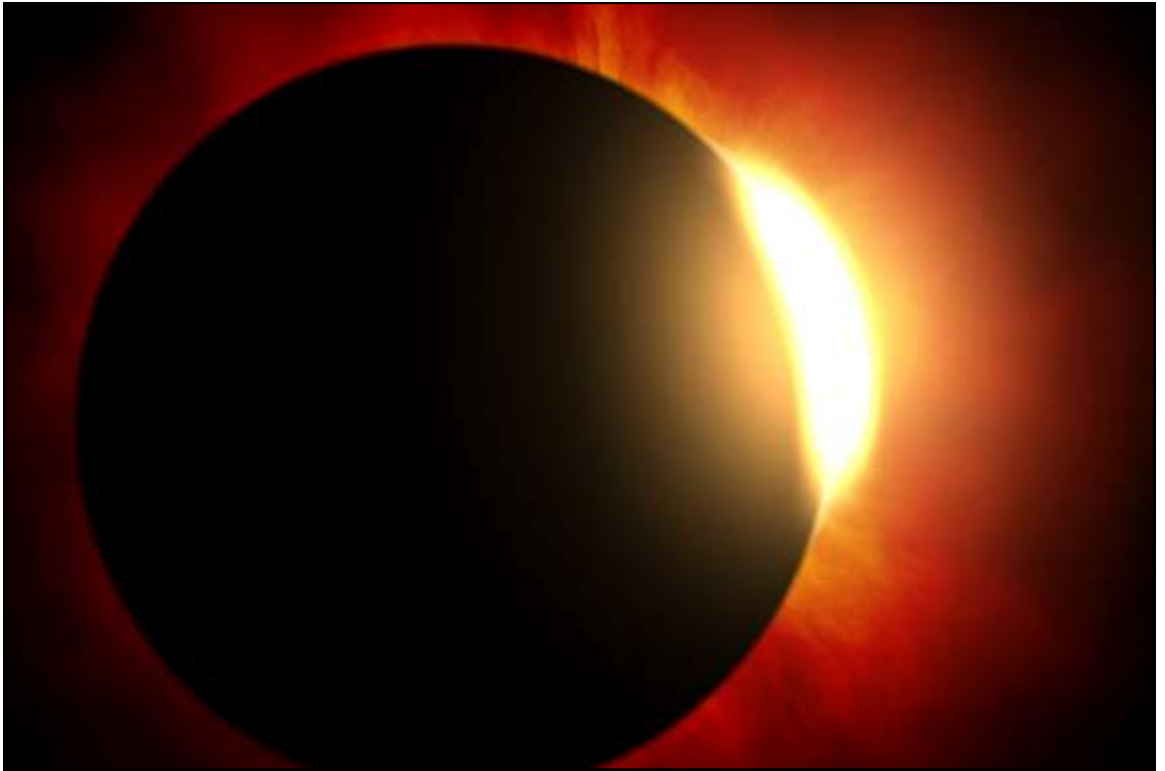

When the population began moving out of the downtown area in the 1960's, this congregation felt strongly that God was calling us to stay here in the heart of the city. Since that time, the Cathedral has birthed all kinds of ministries, caring for the homeless, for children and the elderly, and working to promote the arts, education and healthcare. We are now striving to create a vibrant neighborhood around Billy Goat Hill, a place where diverse peoples of many income levels can live and grow together. We believe that by **worshipping and serving God in the urban core, we can catch a glimpse of God's love.**

We welcome all people. Our nursery is open all morning on Sundays. HELP STOP HUNGER IN JACKSONVILLE

Your Outreach Council is focusing cathedral efforts on fighting hunger in the coming year. If you are age 6 to 100+ come join the fight! **September is Hunger Action month, and St. John's Cathedral is assembling food packets that provide a full day's nutrition for a family of four.**



For our first event, the cathedral joins with Hunger Fight, a local organization that has perfected food packaging for food banks, hunger agencies, and emergency services. YOU can help!

Here's why: Kids Count, a nation-wide study of children in poverty found that Florida ranks 45th out of the 50 states in terms of economic well-being. According to the Kids Count study, 25% of Duval County children live in poverty, approximately 51,000 youth in 2015. The Florida Department of Elder Affairs says that of the approximately 80,000 elder households in our city, 20% are cost-burdened in a way that makes it difficult to decide whether to pay for food, medicine, or utilities first. Clearly, hunger is a critical issue. We live in a caring community, and one of our largest hunger-relief agencies provided 4.2 million pounds of food to houses of worship and community agencies throughout Jacksonville.

Lector A reading from the Book of Genesis.

Joseph could no longer control himself before all those who stood by him, and he cried out, **“Send everyone away from me.” So no one stayed with him when Joseph made himself known** to his brothers. And he wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it, and the household of **Pharaoh heard it. Joseph said to his brothers, “I am Joseph. I will provide for you there—since there are five more years of famine to come—so that you and your household, and all that you have, will not come to poverty.” And now your eyes and the eyes of my brother Benjamin see that it is my own mouth that speaks to you. You must tell my father how greatly I am honored in Egypt, and all that you have seen. Hurry and bring my father down here.” Then he fell upon his brother Benjamin’s neck and wept, while Benjamin wept upon his neck. And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them; and after that his brothers talked with him.
