Since that time, the Cathedral has birthed all kinds of ministries, caring for the homeless, for children and the elderly, and working to promote the arts, education and healthcare. We are now striving to create a vibrant neighborhood around Billy Goat Hill, a place where diverse peoples of many income levels can live and grow together. We believe that by **worshipping and serving God in the urban core, we can catch a glimpse of God's love.**

We welcome all people. Our nursery is open all morning on Sundays. I remember vividly the day that God became real to me....and here's my story.

In 1998 I found myself going through a divorce after living a lovely life in an almost “Leave it to Beaver” existence. My children and I were sharing a two bedroom apartment in a complex I could afford...and rest assured...I couldn't afford much at the time. Daddy was suffering with cancer and for reasons I will never understand my mother turned her anger at Daddy's cancer toward me and my sister. It was a dark and difficult time.



Harry Lee Jamerson my strong, loving and brilliant daddy died July 10, 1999. That day was extremely busy—filled with duties that must be attended to immediately and as the oldest child I took them on. My primary concern, however, was helping my children deal with the grief of losing their much beloved Pop-Pop and trying not to come completely unglued myself.

That night as the children slept, I went into the shower and turned the water on full blast so that Julia and Jamerson could not hear my sobs. I fell apart. Never in my life had I felt so empty, scared and ANGRY at God. I raised my fist and shook it with all I had in me. How could He take my daddy? My rock? I screamed, “I have no husband and now I have no daddy!” At that instant I heard my God say to me, “I am your Daddy and I am your Husband.” Instantaneously His peace and His strength enveloped me. It was indescribable—in that moment that He became my God!

Early one morning, years later, I was enjoying a cup of coffee with the Lord and amazingly came across Isaiah 54:5! He is and His Word is living and active.

That's my story...I look forward to hearing yours.



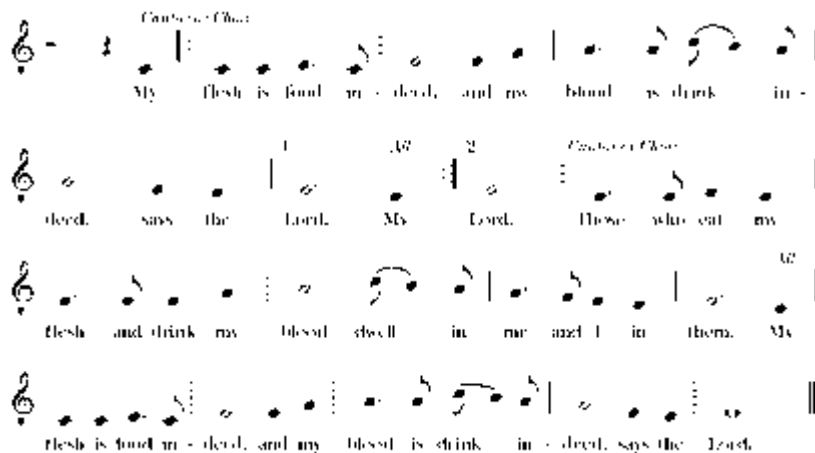
