CELEBRATING ADVENT AT THE CATHEDRAL

The word *Advent* comes from the Latin word *adventus* meaning “coming” or “visit.” Advent is the beginning of a new liturgical year in the Episcopal Church, and the first Sunday of Advent is the Sunday nearest the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle and continues until the birth of Our Lord is celebrated. Excitement surrounds Advent as we Christians anticipate, wait, prepare and decorate for the celebration of Christ's glorious birth, as well as for the time when Christ will come again and fulfill all that was promised to us from Genesis to Revelation!



Some historians believe that it was actually Saint Peter himself who first celebrated Advent. However, the oldest documented account is from a passage in the second book of the *History of the Franks* by St. Gregory of Tours stating that St. Perpetuus, the Bishop of Tours, had decreed a fast **three times a week, from the feast of St. Martin until Christmas in the year 480.** Today's Christians would barely recognize early Advent, as it had more of the look and feel of Lent with an emphasis placed on fasting and prayer. As the traditions of Advent evolved, the theme of prayerful, spiritual preparations for the second and final coming of the Lord were blended with the joyful preparations for the annual festive celebrations of the birth of Jesus.

Today is the beginning of Advent. Our annual Advent Wreath workshop starts at 9 a.m. in Burwell Court and this Bishop's Garden. Come and learn the symbolism behind the Hope, Peace, Joy, Love and Christ candles and create your very own Advent wreath to add to your holiday decorations. I will teach a brief liturgical workshop on the season of Advent right after the 11 a.m. service in the sanctuary. This evening, you are invited to return to the cathedral for the Advent Procession of Lessons and Carols starting at 5 p.m.

May you and your family be truly blessed this Advent season by all the Advent festivities we have planned for you at St. John's Cathedral. See a calendar in the back of this bulletin for service times and special events.

Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven. From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things**

taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: **Keep awake.**”

We ask you to welcome into your embrace those who we love who have died, that they may see you face to face. (We remember especially...) Lord, we wait for you.
Lord, come among us.

He offered his life for sinners and with a love stronger than death he opened wide his arms on the cross.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it or lay a hand upon it: and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died, he came to supper with his friends, and taking bread, he gave you thanks. He broke it and gave it to them, saying: Take eat: this is my body which is given for you

At the end of supper, taking the cup of wine, he gave you thanks, and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

As we eat and drink these holy things in your presence, form us into the likeness of Christ, and build us into a living temple to your glory. Remember Lord your Church in every land. Reveal her unity, guard her faith, and preserve her in peace. Bring us at the last with John and all the saints to the vision of that eternal splendor for which you have created us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, by him, with him, and in him, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

Blessing and honor and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.

The Celebrant continues

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The election for those positions will be conducted at the Parish Annual Meeting on February 4, 2018. Parish members are encouraged to submit the names of nominees to Nancy Purcell, Communications Director, at npurcell@jaxcathedral.org. It is important that you obtain the permission of your nominee before submitting his or her name to the Nominating Committee. Nominations will be forwarded to and reviewed by the nominating committee members: Kirk Altman, Martha Cox, **Robert Hyde, Claude Moulton, Joe O'Shields,** and Faye Wisner. Nominations must be submitted by December 5, 2017.

Qualifications for Vestry members (4 to be elected): A Vestry nominee 1) must be a communicant of St. John's Cathedral in good standing for a period of at least 12 months prior to election; 2) if a nominee has served two full terms (for a total of six years), there must be a two-year break before he or she may be nominated again; 3) must be actively involved in the ministries of the Parish; 4) must be willing to accept active leadership, including responsibility for decision making that represents the entire Parish; 5) must, if called upon, serve on the boards of affiliated corporations of the Cathedral; 6) must be willing to invest the time necessary in the ministry of leadership, including attendance at worship, Vestry meetings and other scheduled Vestry activities, special events, and satellite activities; and 7) must be otherwise eligible. In addition to the above qualifications contained in the bylaws, the Vestry believes that nominees for service should possess special skills, gifts and talents in visionary and strategic thinking, be courageous, and have skills in fiscal planning and policy. Finally, the Vestry is seeking members who represent the diverse composition of our congregation.

Diocesan Convention Delegates (2 to be elected): The Senior Warden fills one of the five delegate positions. The remaining four delegates serve two year terms, with one or two rotating off each year. At the 2018 Annual Meeting, we will elect two delegates and two alternates for the 2018 Diocesan Convention.
