The first Festival of Nine Lessons with Carols was held in Truro Cathedral, Christmas Eve 1878. The service was created to replace the practice of the Cathedral Choir caroling parishioners at their homes, but to still offer the Christmas cheer of hearing beloved carols. Edward Benson, then bishop of Truro, later became Archbishop of Canterbury and the Festival service began to spread. The most famous Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols is that of King's College, Cambridge, which began in 1918. The longest running service in the U.S. is celebrated at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Hanover, NH, which has presented the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols since 1935.

St. John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation.

Lector A Reading from the Gospel according to St. John.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. Timothy Tuller, Canon for Music

Timothy Tuller is a native of Elmira, New York, where he began piano and organ lessons at the age of eight and gave his first performance at age fourteen. He graduated summa cum laude from Ithaca College, and then earned his Master of Music degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he was a student of Todd Wilson and received the Valedictory Prize.

Tim served as the Assistant University Organist at the University of the South from 2000-2003 under the direction and tutelage of organist and educator, Dr. Robert Delcamp. While on "the Mountain," Tim assisted with every aspect of the music program, accompanying up to nine services per week at the University Chapel and the School of Theology. During his tenure at Sewanee, he accompanied the University's choir on several tours, including a residency at York Minster, and was featured on the resulting 2-CD recording. After Sewanee, Tim subsequently served as the Music Associate at the Cathedral Church of the Advent in Birmingham, Alabama. In addition to serving as the primary organist for the Cathedral, he accompanied the Cathedral Choir on a 2004 residency at St. Alban's and Ely Cathedrals, in England. He was also the featured organist for their 2006 recording "Praise ye the Lord."

Since 2007, Tim has been the Canon for Music at St. John's Cathedral in Jacksonville, Florida. As Canon, Tim's duties include playing the Cathedral's

magnificent 1983 Austin organ for all Cathedral services, conducting the 40-voice Cathedral Choir, and presiding over an extensive music series of secular and sacred performances. Under Tim's direction, the Cathedral Choir has sung choral residencies at Ely Cathedral (2010), Canterbury Cathedral and Westminster Abbey. (2014), and the National Cathedral in Washington, D. C. (2018).

Tim has more than thirty years of ecclesiastical performance experience in several denominations and has a particular fondness for English choral music. In addition to his duties at the Cathedral, Tim has been active in the Jacksonville musical community. He has served as accompanist for several local choral groups including the Orange Park Chorale and the choral department at the University of North Florida. An active recitalist, Tim was a featured performer at the 2017 Southeastern Regional Convention of the American Guild of Organists, and at the 2018 St. Augustine Music Festival.
