#### The First Reading

Luke 1:26-31, 38

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you." But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus." Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.



### The Second Reading

Luke 2:1-5


A decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child.



#### The Third Reading

Luke 2:6-7, 16


While Joseph and Mary were in Bethlehem, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.



### The Fourth Reading

Luke 2:8-14

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" After the angels had left, the shepherds said to each other, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see what the Lord has told us about. They went with haste and found Mary, Joseph, and the baby in the manger.



### The Fifth Reading

Luke 2:17-20

After seeing the baby, the shepherds told everyone what had happened and what the angels had said to them about this child. All who heard the shepherds' story were astonished, but Mary kept all these things in her heart and thought about them often. The shepherds went back to their flocks, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen. It was just as the angels had told them.

#### The Holy Communion

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

**People** And also with you.

Celebrant Lift up your hearts.

**People** We lift them up to you.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord.

**People** It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Celebrant In the beginning, God made the whole world and everything in it. God made us, too. Because God loves us, God lets us make our own choices. Sometimes, we make bad choices that hurt us or other people. And then God is like a strong mother, or gentle father who comes close to us and helps us.

God also came close to our parents and grandparents and great-grandparents and everyone back to the beginning of time.

God saw all the bad choices that people made. So, God visited us in a very special way, to show us again how to love each other. God came to us in the form of a baby named Jesus.

Jesus included all people as his friends and told us to do the same. Some people didn't want to change, and they became angry. They wanted to hurt Jesus; they even wanted to kill him. So, Jesus gathered all his friends for a special meal.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat; This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Loving God, remembering now the suffering and death and proclaiming the resurrection and ascension of Jesus our Redeemer, we bring you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for us, your people, the Body and Blood of Christ. And send your Holy Spirit upon us, and fill us with your life and goodness.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and forever.

Celebrant Now let's say together the prayer that Jesus taught us.

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Celebrant When we eat and drink this holy food, it's not only food for our hungry bodies. It's food for our hungry and tired hearts. And when we eat and drink it, we remember Jesus, and how he loves us and wants us to love each other.
