The Lesson 1 Corinthians 1:10-18

Reader A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians

Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say that you were

baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power. For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles—the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to proclaim, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near." As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him. Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.

Three decades ago, 10 children gathered at St. John's Cathedral for a dance class.

This small moment in 1993 marked the inception of the Cathedral Arts Project, and the beginning of an extraordinary community journey to make arts education accessible to all children. This year, the organization celebrates its 30th anniversary and its impact by providing more than 31,000 children in Northeast Florida with professional arts education in art as therapy, dance, media arts, music, theatre and visual arts.

What began as a single dance class run by a group of volunteers is now a nationally recognized nonprofit that offers multidisciplinary programs at more than 30 schools and community sites and enrolls over 1,300 students annually. What is most impressive, however, is the transformative impact of CAP's programs on the children who participate.

On average, CAP students score seven points higher on standardized tests and achieve higher grade level proficiency than their non-arts-involved peers. CAP knows, and research confirms, that participation in the arts leads to greater self-confidence, creative thinking, higher graduation rates, enhanced leadership skills, teamwork and perseverance, and empathy for others.

CAP's vision is for Northeast Florida to lead the nation in providing essential and accessible arts education that recognizes, grows and amplifies every child's unique skills and strengths. As we consider the remarkable impact of CAP's programs over the last 30 years, we aim to magnify that impact by reaching more children, in more places, in more ways.

We look forward to more fully realizing our mission to empower every child's creative spirit, elevate arts educators in their field, and advocate for access and equity in arts education over the next 30 years.

THE SEASON OF EPIPHANY

Celebrated from the Feast of the Epiphany (Jan. 6) through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday (Feb. 21), the season of Epiphany is when we celebrate the revealing of Christ to the world. Jesus' identity as the Son of God is dramatically revealed in the scripture readings during the weeks of Epiphany, calling us as Christians to respond to Christ in faith. Epiphany is, above all, about the truth of Jesus as the Messiah, the glory of the Father, shining forth to the whole world.
