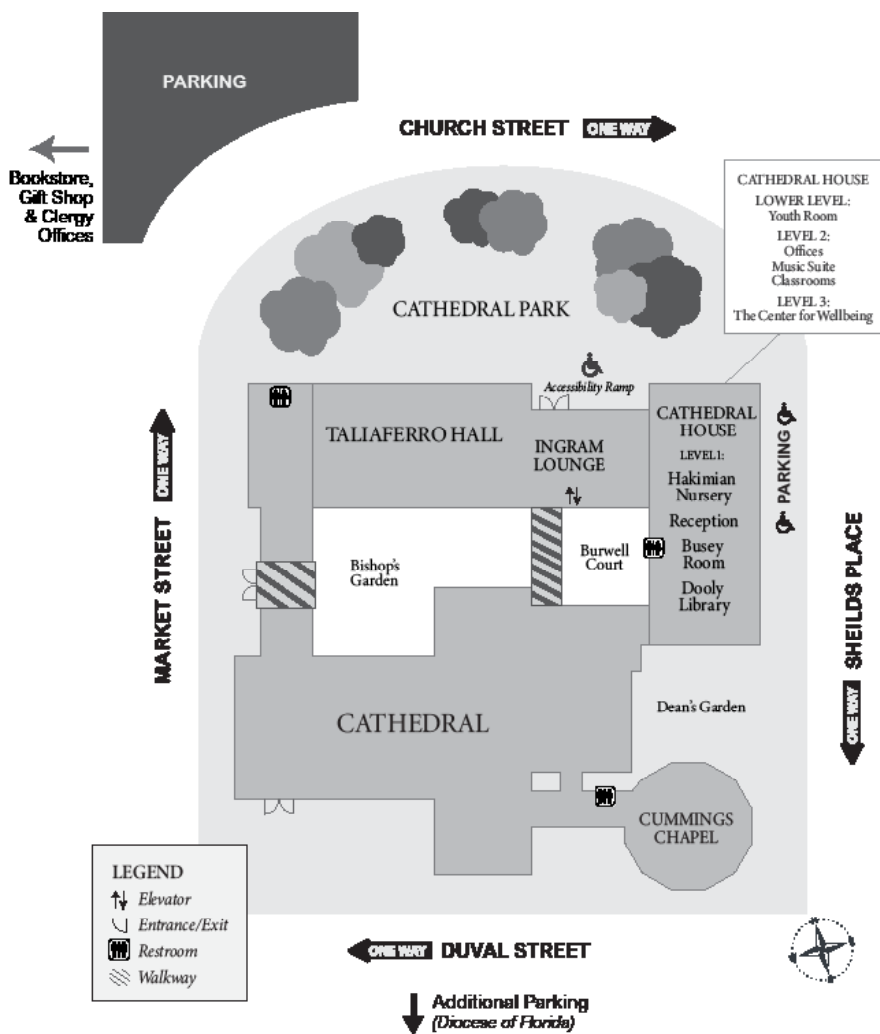

The Lesson: Philippians 2:1-13

If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish

ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence, but much more now in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure.

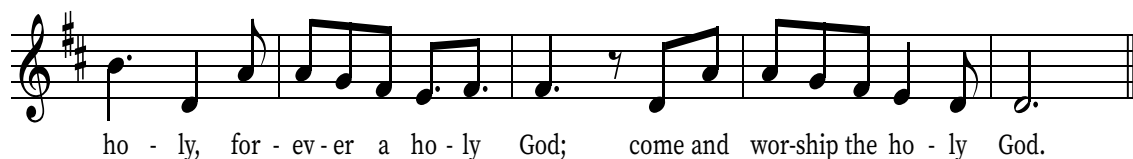

The Psalms are the Church's oldest hymnal and prayer book. Even before the Church existed, Jesus himself prayed these words. In worship, the psalm is often spoken together as a way of shaping our community's hearts.

All stand.

At 10:30 a.m., the Cathedral Choir will lead the verses of this hymn, and we invite the congregation to join the Choir in singing.

We sing, offering ourselves to God to prepare for the Gospel.

The clergy read the Gospel in the midst of the congregation because in Jesus the Word of God was carried to the people.

A period of silence is kept following the sermon.*

The Nicene Creed is a statement of trust, and not of certainty. We are saying "We believe in you, God."

Jesus answered, "Do you believe because I told you that I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than these." The Sermon

The Very Rev. Kate Moorehead Carroll

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Prayers of the People

Let us pray for the Church and for the world, trusting that through the power of God's love, we may become whole.

For the earth that slowly spins, and for every nation that has claimed a space upon it; for peace where war rages, for reconciliation where estrangement exists, for refugees where homelands are unsafe. Help us care for the whole of creation: from the smallest ant to the largest whale. Heal us and mend us,

That we may become whole.

For Jacksonville: for our neighbors downtown and in every neighborhood, for those who care for the unhoused, for public servants, and for those who keep our city running while others sleep. Help us become one community where love and grace abound. Heal us and mend us,

That we may become whole.

For your Church on every continent, and especially for the Diocese of Florida and our bishop-elect, The Rev. J. Randolph Alexander, Jr.: that the Body of Christ, so often torn, may be stitched together in love, thread by thread and seam by seam. Where we have once been divided, make us whole. Heal us and mend us,

That we may become whole.

For this Cathedral, and for everyone who calls this place home, that we may give to others as you have given unto us: inspire us to give our hearts, our time, and our resources. Help us become people who give freely and generously, for we have been shaped by God's abundance. Heal us and mend us,

That we may become whole.

For those whose bodies are tired or in pain; for those whose minds are anxious or whose hearts are heavy; for the lonely, the grieving, and all who are in trouble. May they feel your healing hand upon them and the arms of this community around them. Heal us and mend us,

That we may become whole.

For those who have died, and for those who love them: that they may be gathered at last into the wholeness of your kingdom, where every division ends, every wound is healed, and every tear is wiped away. Heal us and mend us,

That we may become whole.

Confession of Sin

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Ever-loving God, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word, and deed. We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. In your mercy, forgive what we have done, help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be, that we may do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with you, our God. Amen.

May the God who is both power and love forgive you and free you from your sin, give you healing and strength, and raise you to new life in Christ. **Amen.**

The Prayers of the People are written by our clergy at the start of each season.

The celebrant add a concluding prayer.

All kneel or stand as able. A period of silence invites us to reflect on our own lives and our need for forgiveness.

Confession is a process of letting go, forgiving others, and being forgiven by God.

The Resurrected Christ, when he appeared to the disciples, said these words.

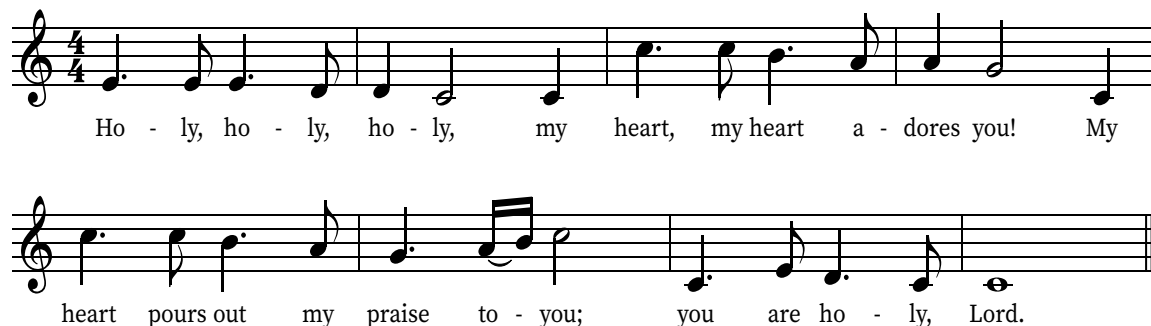
At your command all things came to be: shining light and enfolding dark; the vast expanse of interstellar space, galaxies, suns, and this fragile earth, our island home.

At 10:30 a.m., if you are in need of confidential prayers, please come to the chapel to the right of the altar (the South Transcept).

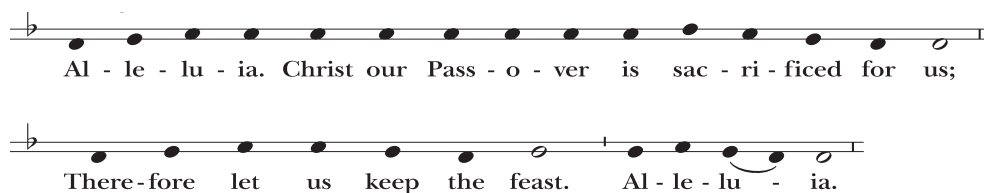
At 10:30 a.m., a socially-distant communion table is set in the chapel to the left of the altar (the North Transcept).
