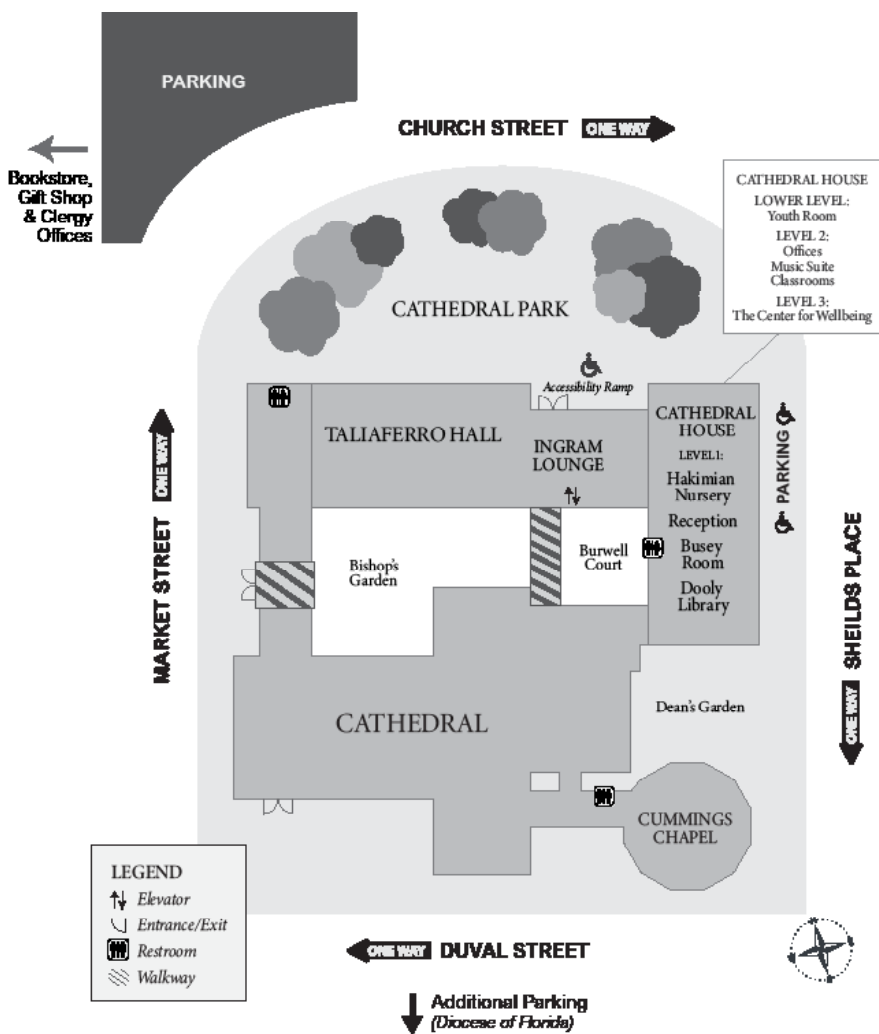

The Lesson: Exodus 14:19-31

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." Then the Lord said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not. On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather on other days." So Moses and Aaron said

to all the Israelites, “In the evening you shall know that it was the Lord who brought you out of the land of Egypt, and in the morning you shall see the glory of the Lord, because he has heard your complaining against the Lord. For what are we, that you complain against us?” And Moses said, “When the Lord gives you meat to eat in the evening and your fill of bread in the morning, because the Lord has heard the complaining that you utter against him—what are we? Your complaining is not against us but against the Lord.” Then Moses said to Aaron, “Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, ‘Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining.’” And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. The Lord spoke to Moses and said, “I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, ‘At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God.’” In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, “What is it?” For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, “It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat.”

**Remember the marvels he has done, his wonders and the judgments of his mouth,**

**He led out his people with silver and gold; in all their tribes there was not one that stumbled.**

**Egypt was glad of their going, because they were afraid of them.**

**He spread out a cloud for a covering and a fire to give light in the night season.**

**They asked, and quails appeared, and he satisfied them with bread from heaven.**

**He opened the rock, and water flowed, so the river ran in the dry places.**

**For God remembered his holy word and Abraham his servant.**

**So he led forth his people with gladness, his chosen with shouts of joy.**

**He gave his people the lands of the nations, and they took the fruit of others' toil,**

**That they might keep his statutes and observe his laws. Hallelujah!**

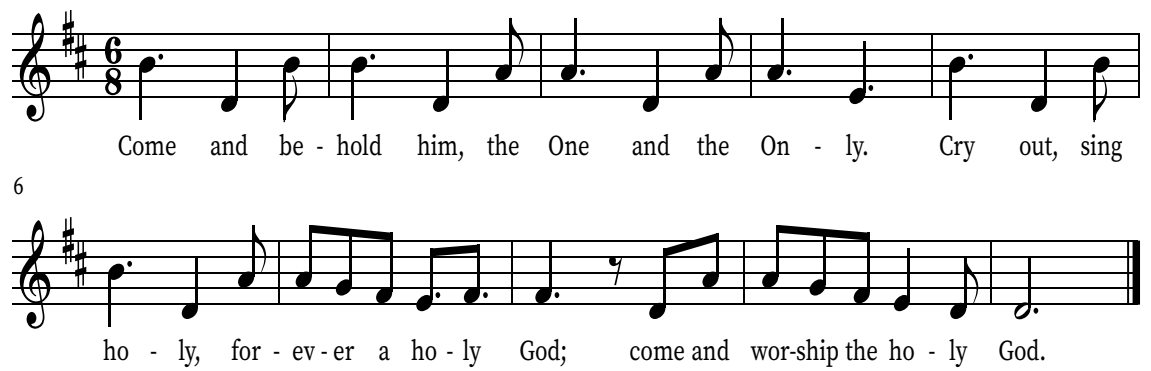

The Holy Gospel: Matthew 20:1-16

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew.  
**Glory to you, O Christ.**

Jesus said, "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

The Sermon

The Rev. Canon Mark S. Anderson

**We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.**

**We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.**

**We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.**

#### The Prayers of the People

Let us pray for the Church and for the world, trusting that through the power of God's love, we may become whole.

For the earth that slowly spins, and for every nation that has claimed a space upon it; for peace where war rages, for reconciliation where estrangement exists, for refugees where homelands are unsafe. Help us care for the whole of creation: from the smallest ant to the largest whale. Heal us and mend us,

**That we may become whole.**

For Jacksonville: for our neighbors downtown and in every neighborhood, for those who care for the unhoused, for public servants, and for those who keep our city running while others sleep. Help us become one community where love and grace abound. Heal us and mend us,

**That we may become whole.**

For your Church on every continent, and especially for the Diocese of Florida and our new bishop-elect, The Rev. J. Randolph Alexander, Jr.: that the Body of Christ, so often torn, may be stitched together in love, thread by thread and seam by seam. Where we have once been divided, make us whole. Heal us and mend us,

**That we may become whole.**

For this Cathedral, and for everyone who calls this place home, that we may give to others as you have given unto us: inspire us to give our hearts, our time, and our resources. Help us become people who give freely and generously, for we have been shaped by God's abundance. Heal us and mend us,

**That we may become whole.**

For those whose bodies are tired or in pain; for those whose minds are anxious or whose hearts are heavy; for the lonely, the grieving, and all who are in trouble. May they feel

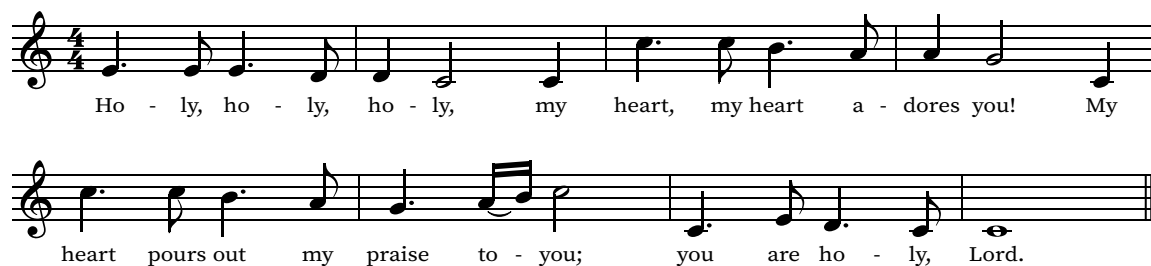

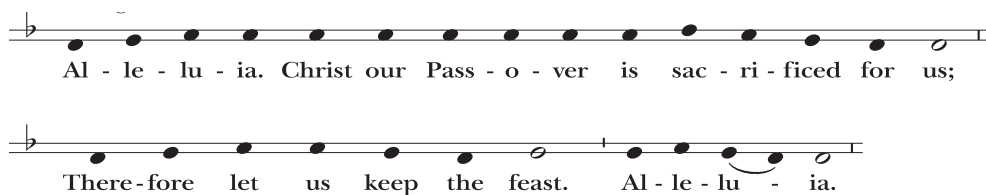
